Foreword

Victorian Emergency Management Commissioner

In Victoria we recognise that building safer and more resilient communities is a shared responsibility for all Victorians, not just our emergency services sector. This requires community involvement and engagement across all emergency phases including preparedness, mitigation, response and recovery.

Victoria has one of the most diverse communities in the world. Close to half of all Victorians were born overseas or have at least one parent born overseas, more than a quarter speak a language other than English at home, and more than 130 faiths are followed.

Therefore, for safer and more resilient communities in Victoria, sustainable and collaborative partnerships are required between multicultural communities and the emergency services sector.

The Multicultural Emergency Management Partnership model provides a unique opportunity to bring together multicultural leaders and emergency services organisations to establish and strengthen relationships. The model can assist our sector to better understand the strengths of diverse community networks that can be drawn upon and can improve communities' understanding of how to better prepare for, respond to and recover from emergencies.

This partnership will facilitate two-way knowledge sharing with the potential to increase the sector's capability and capacity to effectively engage with the diverse communities that make up Victoria, and to improve outcomes from emergencies.

I look forward to contributing to and learning from this partnership.

Commencing late July 2021, representatives from the Multicultural Community Advisory Group and Emergency Management Working Group came together to develop effective and ongoing engagement between multicultural communities and Emergency Management organisations. This work has culminated in the establishment of the Multicultural Emergency Management Partnership (MEMP).

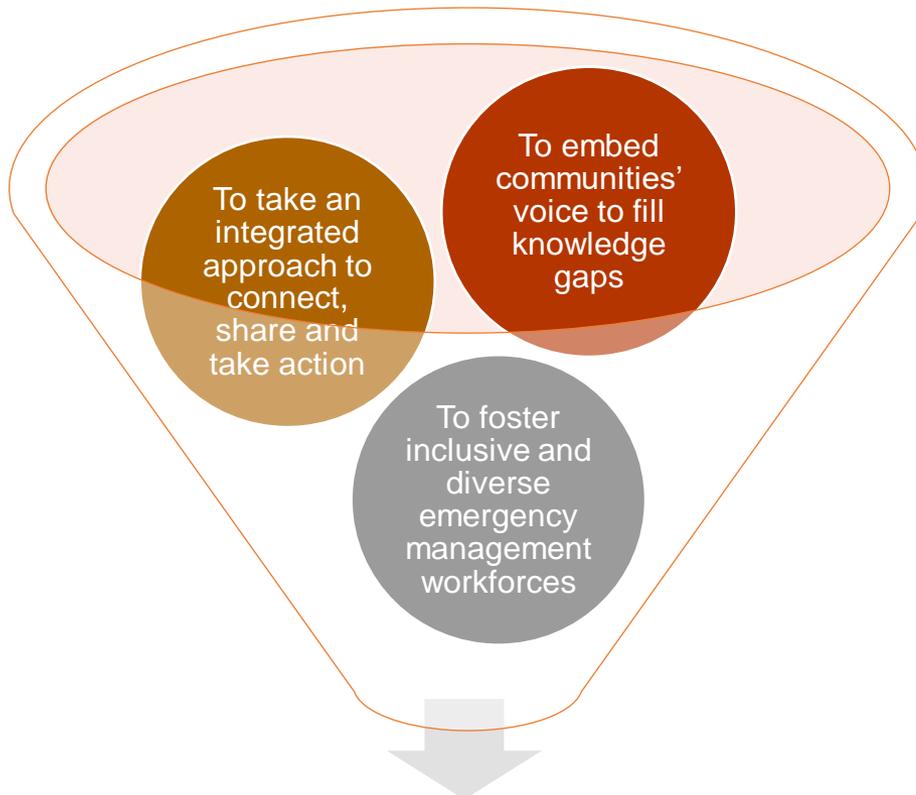

- To provide greater **cultural safety** and **cultural responsiveness** for all who participate in and with emergency management organisations
- To increase **mutual understanding and trust** between multicultural communities and emergency management organisations
- To strengthen **community resilience** by enabling communities to prepare for, cope with and recover from the impacts of emergencies

How we work

We will take a strengths-based approach to community resilience building by:

- listening to and learning from each other with mutual respect
- valuing and building on the strengths of our diverse cultural and language backgrounds
- providing a culturally safe platform to work and connect with others
- celebrating our successes, while learning from challenges
- as leaders, supporting our own self-care and each other's emotional wellbeing
- actively addressing prejudice through our alliance, being conscious of the impacts of structural and systemic bias and racism in our work

Definitions

Cultural safety¹ - creating a space where everyone can examine their own cultural identities and attitudes and be open-minded and flexible in attitudes towards people from cultures that differ to their own. It requires everyone to understand that their own values or practices are not always or only the best way to solve problems.

Disaster² - A serious disruption of the functioning of a community or a society at any scale leading to human, material, economic and environmental losses and impacts.

Emergency² - An event, actual or imminent, which endangers or threatens to endanger life, property or the environment, and which requires a significant and coordinated response. Emergency is sometimes used interchangeably with the term disaster.

Preparedness² - The knowledge and capacities developed to effectively anticipate, respond to and recover from the impacts of likely, imminent or current disasters.

Response² - Actions taken directly before, during or immediately after a disaster in order to save lives, reduce health impacts, ensure public safety and meet the basic needs of people affected.

Relief² - The provision of immediate shelter, life support and human needs of persons affected by, or responding to, an emergency. It includes the establishment, management and provision of services to emergency relief centres.

Recovery² - The coordinated process of supporting emergency-affected communities in restoring emotional, social, economic and physical well-being and the reconstruction of infrastructure.
